

Pollinator Partnership Canada's Annual Report 2024



A Year To Remember A Message From The Executive Director

2024 was a year of growth, action, and solid progress toward our goal of protecting and promoting pollinators across Canada.

<u>Project Wingspan ON</u> continued to engage and train seed collectors focused on monarch butterfly nectar plants. <u>The Pollinator Stewardship Certification</u> program, now in it's 4th year, has trained and Certified over 1,000 Stewards across North America! <u>Bee City Canada</u> grew by 15 members that now promote pollinator programming to 140,000 community members. In the spring we also expanded our arctic pollinator programs to <u>Whitehorse</u>, and over 1500 polar plant-pollinator interactions have been recorded. This increases our capacity to support these species.

We have been making steady progress on policy and pollinator protection standards, including developing new tools for farmers to protect pollinators from pesticides; working with municipalities to refine bylaws and write pollinator protection plans; and working with governments across North America to solidify pollinator protection.

2024 was an impressive year. Let's work together to make 2025 even more impressive. Your support is what makes our programs grow!





Program Feature The Agricultural Guides

Bee Friendly Farming (BFF) programs recognize, engage, and support participants and pollinators everywhere. In 2024, we've added two new "Protecting Pollinators from Pesticides" Agricultural guides for the specialty

from Pesticides" Agricultural guides for the specialty crops Canola and Wild Blueberry. These guides are designed to minimize the impacts of pesticides and other management measures on pollinators, and is written for all those involved in specialty crop production. Each guide covers 4 main practices: integrated pest management (IPM), clear communication between beekeepers and growers, habitat support, and careful pesticide use.






Each "Protecting Pollinators From Pesticides" guide has a supplemental document, which includes information on the pesticide regulatory process of the Pest Management Regulatory Agency (PMRA) in Canada, helping stakeholders make informed decisions. By becoming a Bee Friendly Farming member, you can help preserve and protect the pollinator populations by implementing positive, incremental changes on your property. BFF helps farmers incorporate affordable, simple, science-based guidelines, like offering nutrition and habitats for bees, and integrated pest and pollinator management strategies.

Our ongoing work in the Canadian Territories started in Yellowknife in 2021 with federal grant funding from Environment and Climate Change Canada's Habitat Stewardship Program. This year we expanded our project into Whitehorse, Yukon!

The goal of our project is to learn more about the native flowers bumble bees and other native pollinators are using around Whitehorse through community science to better understand how we can protect them. Field work involves observing patches of wildflowers around town, recording all bee and pollinator occurrences on those patches of flowers, and then uploading each observation to iNaturalist for species identification and location data.

Every picture uploaded to our iNaturalist page helps improve our data all while helping us better understand specific plant-pollinator interactions and the diversity of bee species each type of native flower attracts. We currently have 5,274 pollinator observations included in the project with 221 species identified! Next steps for this project include hosting an in-person Pollinator Steward Training workshop, and creating a downloadable guide to common bumble bees and native plants found in Whitehorse.

Going forward we are planning to complete our northern work in all three Canadian Territories with an expansion of our Plan Bee project in Iqaluit, Nunavut!

In 2024, we participated in various events and collaborated with different partners across Canada to raise awareness for pollinator conservation. We celebrated World Bee Day with the staff of the **Fairmont Royal York Hotel** in Toronto and gave a talk on the importance of pollinators and pollinated food, next to their hives on their rooftop. As a part of the Project Wingspan Ontario program, we led two Seed Collection Workshops: in Puslinch, ON at the **Bee Sweet Nature Co. plant nursery**, and at the **Toronto Botanical Garden**. Through these workshops, attendees increased their awareness of monarch butterfly (*Danaus plexippus*) management in Canada, as well as how they can make a positive difference through seed collection.

Together with Skills for Change and Project Swallowtail Block Ambassador, Douglas Counter, we led over 40 youth in the Youth Climate Action Initiative in exploring the importance of pollinators and native plants. Participants enjoyed hands-on activities like potting-up seedlings and collecting seeds, while learning about conservation's positive effects on mental health and well-being. Each attendee also received two native plant kits, totaling over 200 plants distributed!

This is just a small example of what we accomplished with other groups. We look forward to more collaborations in the new year!

Our Campaigns The Bee Blitz

For World Bee Day, we launched the first edition of the Bee Blitz campaign that aims to raise awareness to the over 970 species of native bees in Canada.

While we started with the objective of raising \$970 to match the number of native bee species in the country, we quickly exceeded our goal by raising \$3,500 thanks to the generosity of the Fairmont Royal York Hotel that matched the donations.

The Bee Blitz campaign was created to show the diversity of native bees found in Canada. Each of these species contribute to the regeneration and good health of ecosystems. However, more discreet than honey bees, these wild bees are often forgotten. Our mission is therefore to put them in the spotlight and show their importance. Thanks to the support of our donors, all the proceeds went to our bee-focus programs such as Bee City Canada or Yellowknife Plan Bee.



Campaign Spotlight: Wings of Hope

From September to November, we promoted the Wings of Hope campaign which is a call to come together and support pollinator populations. For the 2024 campaign, butterflies were in the spotlight, and we highlighted various native butterfly species in Canada that need our attention.







